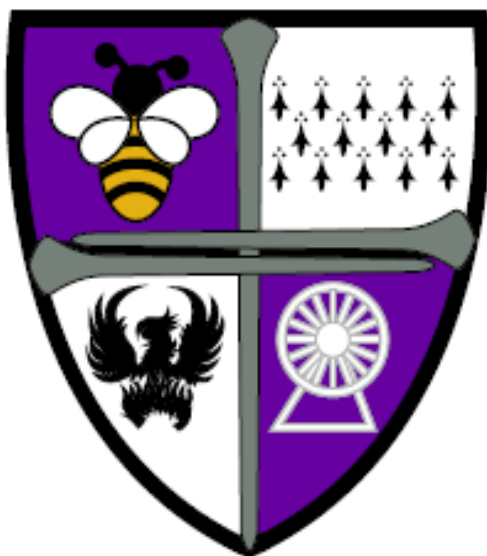

1 Introduction

- 1.1 It is our policy that all children should wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. We provide a complete list of the items needed for school uniform for new parents and can be found in the Parent Handbook

2 Aims and Objectives

Our policy is based on the belief that a school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a feeling of community and belonging;
- is practical and smart;
- identifies the children with the school;
- is not distracting to learning;
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is regarded as suitable, and good value for money, by most parents and carers;
- has been designed with health and safety in mind.

3 Jewellery and Nail Varnish

3.1 On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. Jewellery can also serve as a distraction to other pupils or become lost. No earrings should be worn. If you wish your child to have pierced ears, it would help us if this could be done at the beginning of the summer holidays. When ears have been recently pierced, we ask that surgical tape is applied at home to cover the studs during school time. Pupils with studs who come to school without tape covering may be given surgical tape by the school to safely cover their own earrings. Nail varnish is not acceptable for children at school.

4 Hair and Extreme haircuts

4.1 The school does not permit children to have haircuts that could serve as a distraction to other children. Children with long hair should have it tied back. Trim lines or patterns cut into the hair are not acceptable.

5 Footwear

5.1 The school wants all children to grow into healthy adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes with platform soles or high heels in school, so we do not allow this. Neither do we allow children to wear slip on shoes or trainers to school; these are appropriate for sport or as leisurewear, but are not in keeping with the smart appearance of a school uniform. We require all children to wear the types of shoe described in the uniform list.

6 The role of parents and carers

6.1 We ask all parents and carers who send their children to our school to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents and carers have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork. Parents and carers should ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair.

6.2 The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are serious reasons, for example religious objections, why parents and carers want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will sympathetically consider such requests.

7 The role of governors

7.1 The governing body supports the head teacher in implementing the School Uniform Policy. It considers all representations from parents and carers regarding this policy, and liaises with the head teacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity.

7.2 Governors ensure that the school uniform policy helps children to dress sensibly, in clothing that is hardwearing, safe and practical.

8 Monitoring and review

8.1 When monitoring this policy, through its committee work, the governing body will from time to time:

- seek the views of parents and carers,
- consider with the headteacher any requests from parents or carers for individual children to have special dispensations;

- require the headteacher to report to the governors on the way in which the policy is being implemented.

8.2 This policy will be reviewed by the governing body every three years or sooner if considered
